



**Quick Overview** – The "Los Gatos Birdwatcher" provides many opportunities each month to involve people with nature. *Let's Go birding* partners with Los Gatos Birdwatcher providing full day birding adventures. The Gazos Creek Road is known for its Spring and Fall birding, but we selected this destination for July so that we could take folks to a beautiful habitat most had never visited, and to avoid possible summer temperatures. Located on the Pacific coast & north of Santa Cruz, this dead-end road borders Ana Nuevo Reserve, Big Basin State Park and Butano State Park. Before we arrived we first stopped at Rancho Del Oso. This short bathroom stop was actually quite birdy as species were vocalizing in the surrounding evergreens. Finding the Pygmy Nuthatches and Hairy Woodpeckers proved fruitless! We then headed to Gazos Creek Road. The first 3 miles are considered the most active for bird life. Most of our birding was done by ear and the song of every Swainson's Thrush was music to our ears. Taking a left onto Cloverdale brought us up close with several Black Headed Grosbeaks. Males, females and youngsters were actively feeding and singing. With the entrance to Butano State Park near we decided to have lunch in the shade of the giant Redwoods. After lunch we continued farther down Gazos Creek Road entering a fern covered Redwood forest. Banana Slugs were all we found so we headed to Pigeon Point Lighthouse where we ended our day with sea bird species and beautiful blue skies.
