

**San Luis National Wildlife Refuge plus Tule Elk – Jan. 19, 2013** Winter Birding California's Central Valley - Trip Leader – Lisa Myers



**Quick Overview** – This would be the first time most of this group had ever been to the San Luis National Wildlife Refuge and there was a lot to see with the new visitor's center, all the wintering waterfowl and we can't forget the Tule Elk herd that reside here. Let's Go Birding & the Los Gatos Birdwatcher work together to plan new destinations so folks get to visit places they have never been. As we entered the refuge we were surprised to find a Barn Owl sitting on a fence post and all got great views. We then drove the waterfowl auto tour. The Bald Eagle was a target bird and we soon found a subadult circling overhead with several Red-tailed Hawks. With the hunting season in full swing the waterfowl were a bit cautious, but with each stop we'd find new species tucked away within the reeds. Snow & Ross's Geese were only observed overhead, but Greater White Fronted Geese were scattered throughout the ponds. We found some hard to find species like Wilson's Snipe & Common Gallinules, and a flock of several hundred Sandhill Cranes put on guite a show as the birds maneuvered between fields. We stopped for lunch near the Sousa Trail and ate outside near a large pond and a flock of Tundra Swans. These beautiful birds were moving about the entire time with birds leaving the flock and new birds arriving. All learned the "kwooo" of a wild Tundra Swan. We also observed large flocks of ducks & geese lifting by the thousands from far away fields. We then spent time at the visitor's center exploring their displays and enjoying a Lincoln's Sparrow from the observation window. We ended our day on the

Tule Elk auto tour where we had great views of the herd & ended our day with a Great Horned Owl sleeping in a tree.




