

San Francisco Bay side of San Mateo County – Sept. 14, 2013

The Fall Migration is underway - Trip Leader - Lisa Myers



Quick Overview — San Mateo County, CA. offers such a wide variation in birding habitat that it's hard to decide where to go. This bay area county encompasses habitats along the Pacific Coast, up and over the Santa Cruz Mountains and back down to the marshlands surrounding San Francisco Bay. This day we concentrated on the bay and started our morning just south of the San Francisco Airport at Coyote Point. A blanket of high fog was overhead as we looked for migrants throughout tall stands of Eucalyptus and evergreens when a flock of Pygmy Nuthatch stole the show and were interrupted for a moment by a few Vaux's Swift. From the point we could watch planes approaching to land while we also scanned the waters below for both Elegant and Forster's Terns. One Black Oystercatcher sitting on distant rocks was quite the find! Once back to looking up in the tree tops we found a beautiful Townsend's Warbler, a Red Shouldered Hawk and Turkey Vultures. We then moved to the Marsh Trail and learned what a sturdy product Nikon has to offer! We were also rewarded with a mixed flock of shorebirds. Everything was here from peeps & plovers to Surbirds, Whimbrels and Marbled Godwits. A single Long Billed Curlew also joined the group. Scanning over their heads we found a feeding Harlequin Duck! There was much more area to bird but it was time to head south to Seal Point. Many on the trip had never visited this location and we searched the rolling grasses for anything out of the ordinary, but just House Finch, blackbirds & cowbirds made an appearance. Our next stop - Redwood Shores and the ponds behind Nob Hill. While we ate lunch here we had great views of Black Skimmers, Green Heron, a leucistic Morning Dove and more, but the clock was ticking and we moved on to Radio Road. Holy Cow, birds everywhere including ducks in eclipse plumage and more shorebirds. Mostly Marled Godwits and Willets, but you could find yellow legs and dowitchers tucked here & there. We looked for anything out of range but came up empty handed. A few Blue Winged Teal in eclipse plumage were a nice find. There were more places to go but our day came to an end. And it was a wonderful way to end our day. Thank you all.
